Public Inquiry for Intu Application?



Despite objections from the Town Council, the Parks Trust and Historic England, the planning committee at MK Council has given Intu planning permission for their controversial expansion over Midsummer Boulevard.

Unless the decision is overturned, nearly half the public open space in the concourse, which was set aside for community use and a future public transport link, will be lost. With development sites lying empty around The Point, next to Intu's shopping centre, the Town Council argues there is no excuse to build new shops over public open space that is clearly protected from infill

development in the new CMK Business Neighbourhood Plan.

"A vital democratic principle is at stake," says Dr. Rebecca Kurth, Chair of the Town Council. "Central government promises communities that neighbourhood plans will give local people and businesses real power over what kind of development goes where. But, less than 100 days since landslide referendums approved the new CMK Neighbourhood Plan, MK Council has set it aside."

If this decision is left to stand, MK Council can use the same arguments again to permit infill development on classic CMK infrastructure including grid roads, Market



COME ALONG TO THE PARISH MEETING

Meet your Town Councillors, hear about local issues and find out the latest plans at the Annual Parish Meeting on 15 October. Residents will also have the opportunity to feed back on what they like and don't like about living in CMK, and what improvements they would like to see.

Square and Station Square, as well as on green open spaces.

CMK Town Council has called for a public inquiry. They have referred the matter to the Secretary of State, requesting that MK Council's decision is 'called in' for scrutiny.

Central Library Recognised

CMK's iconic Central Library has been awarded Grade II listed building status. Described by Historic England as having 'a commanding façade', the library was built and opened by the Milton Keynes Development Corporation in 1981. Among its features are the gigantic painting by Boyd & Evans in the main entrance hall, the rooftop glass dome and the popular 'Whisper' sculpture outside the building.

The library today is only part of what was originally planned. The original design envisaged the building being extended at the rear for a museum or archive, with the present building being the first phase of this larger project. This helps to explain the unfinished appearance of the rear of the building.

The listing of the Library follows listings of the Central Bus Station last year, and of the Central Shopping Building in 2010.

CMK to Get New Train Services

A new service of six trains a day each way between London and Blackpool will begin serving Milton Keynes Central station from 2017 under plans announced by Alliance Rail, part of the Arriva group. The new route is also planned to stop at Tamworth, Crewe and Preston, giving Milton Keynes new direct links with these major towns and cities.

MK Futures 2050

Peter Marland, leader of the main Milton Keynes Council, recently announced the formation of an independent commission to plan how the city will grow and develop between now and 2050. The commission, called MK Futures 2050, will explore issues such as the city's economy and identity, and how these may change in the future.

Cyclo Cross Report Published

Following the massive disruption Campbell Park residents experienced during last year's Cyclo Cross event, CMK Town Council requested a report from Milton Keynes Council on the matter. The audit report has now been published, revealing severe mismanagement of the project, which ultimately cost the Council £350,000, almost ten times more than the event's original budget.

Roadworks Damage Midsummer Boulevard

Recent roadworks to resurface the east end of Midsummer Boulevard, near the Theatre, have caused controversy after it was discovered that the granite slabs that run along the edges of the road had been removed, damaged and not replaced. The works have been carried out on the section



between Secklow Gate and Marlborough Gate, and also included removing the speed ramps, which were causing problems for the large number of buses using the road.

CMK Town Council has requested an investigation into why the slabs, which form part of the original design of the boulevard system, have been removed and discarded in this manner. The Town Council feels it is important that works to the roads in CMK retain the original materials and design features of the boulevards and gates, which form a key part of the character of Central Milton Keynes.

New Community Facilities Planned

In the Residents' Questionnaire last year, many people expressed an interest in having new community sports, arts and cultural facilities in CMK. Milton Keynes Council now have advanced plans for a new sports facility on the vacant site next to the Network Rail building on Elder Gate.

The facility will include a new football pitch and multi-use games area, together with changing facilities.

The Town Council are now exploring new community facilities for events and performing arts.

A number of sites around the parish are now being looked at, including sites in Campbell Park and near the Central Library. These two locations were identified in the Town Council questionnaire as the most visited locations in the parish, making them the ideal locations for a new centre of community activity.

New Marina for Campbell Park Canalside

A 100-berth marina will form part of a recently announced housing development at the south east corner of the Campbell Park grid square. The scheme, to be developed by house builder Crest Nicholson, will provide restaurant facilities, a convenience store, nursery and pub, on a vacant site that has been earmarked for development since the 1990s. This site is located beyond the end of the park itself, on the south flank between Avebury Boulevard and Childs Way (H6).

Importantly, the £88 million scheme retains the pedestrian underpass under Overgate, which was to be removed in earlier

plans for the site. The proposal has attracted some criticism in the local press on architectural grounds. The site is one of several around the flanks of Campbell Park that were identified for development in the original masterplan and more recently in the CMK Business Neighbourhood Plan.

The Town Council will work closely with MKDP and Crest Nicholson to ensure the development meets the needs of current and future residents.



Memorial Sculpture Unveiled

A new sculpture was unveiled in Campbell Park recently in honour of the late Edna Read, perhaps our greatest champion of public art in Milton Keynes. The new artwork, named "Animals in War", is a tribute to all the animals that have died in wars, and was donated to the citizens of Milton Keynes by the renowned Scottish sculptor Ronald Rae as a memorial to Edna. She had curated a major

exhibition of sculptures in Campbell Park, and elsewhere in CMK, in the 1990s.

In the 1960s, Edna founded a "City Gallery" which operated out of a white van and persuaded the Milton Keynes Development Corporation to put money aside for art. As a result, a significant amount of public art in CMK is thanks to

"Edna led a full life and was so passionate about the arts, as well as about her home town Milton Keynes," said Ian Michie, Chairman of the Public Arts Trust. "I thought that it was an appropriate memorial and that we all did Edna proud." The large granite sculpture's unveiling was attended by a crowd of visitors, including the Mayor of Milton Keynes, local MP lain Stewart and the High Sheriff of Buckinghamshire. The unveiling was undertaken by Charles Saumarez Smith, the CEO of the Royal Academy of Arts.
