


WARDS & PARISHES IN MK

CMK PARISH



CMK Town Council is divided into 3 wards, as shown.

There are two MKCouncil Borough wards which include part of the CMK parish area. These are CMK and Campbell Park & Old Woughton Wards.

COMMUNITY FACILITY SITE

CAMPBELL PARK MASTERPLAN (04/00586/OUT)



The history of the site to be developed within the Park was outlined, with reference to the Outline planning permission granted 10 years ago



Campbell Park Pavilion

This new building is to be sited alongside of the Belvedere approach so as not to obscure the panoramic view intended at this vantage point. Located on a slope, this building will offer additional panoramic views of the park and landscape beyond. This is intended to be a multi-purpose building which may include:

- a visitor centre where the history, activities, context and original concept of Campbell Park and the wider MK green spaces can be explained/interpreted
- office accommodation for the Milton Keynes Parks Trust
- restaurants and bars
- community use and meeting places
- a winter garden

This building is also particularly located to provide 'back of house', servicing and sheltering opportunities for the other three adjacent outdoor venues – amphitheatre, events plateau and the Belvedere. This should be an landmark building which fuses landscape and architecture and acts as an architectural icon in its own right.

SECOND PUBLIC CONSULTATION



Following much work, a second consultation was launched at the end of 2016 to gauge residents' reaction to the proposals, which would include an increase in precept

Residents' Consultation on a new Pavilion in Campbell Park

CMK Town Council is consulting residents on proposals to provide a new pavilion in Campbell Park with a café/restaurant and community hall and meeting

The pavilion is to be located on the edge of the events plateau overlooking the amphitheatre. The proposed design will use high

quality natural materials and be integrated with the parkland setting. café/restaurant at the northern end will offer extensive sunset. At the southern end, event and meeting spaces v activities for the community. Parking will be located off Av

Why are we taking this initiative?

Although CMK's population is rapidly growing, there is still a lack of facilities or the local community in the parish. The only community centre currently available is Centrecom, which is almost always fully booked. An outdoor sports facility is under construction on Elder Gate near the railway station which is expected to open in 2017

In late 2014, CMK Town Council ran a questionnaire asking residents what facilities they would most like to see provided in CMK and which ones they currently use the most. Campbell Park amenity in CMK. Earlier this year, we





Funding the proposed community pavilion The estimated cost of the total joint project with The Parks Trust is £4.3 million,

of which the Town Council's share is £1.9 million. We expect the Town Council's share to be met by funds paid by developers of new housing schemes, who are obligated to make a contribution




developments, which is required to be spent by February 2018. It is anticipated that a further £500,000 will become available over the next 3 years from residential developments already in the pipeline.

CMK's population is expected to grow from 3,000 residents to 15,000 in the coming years, with many new homes located next to Campbell Park. We anticipate that the remaining £950,000 needed for the project will come from these developments in the longer term. In the interim, we intend to borrow the shortfall from the Public Works Loan Board (PWLB) which lends money to public bodies at low interest rates.

Covering the borrowing costs

We estimate the PWLB borrowing costs will be £45,000 per year (interest plus principal), which will need to be met through the precept. Once the loan is paid off, our business plan forecasts that the new pavilion will cover its own running and maintenance costs. The plan includes commercial activities, such as private functions, which will subsidise community uses.



The monthly Band-D precept charged by the Town Council (£3.80) is substantially lower than the average across the Borough (£7.30). To meet the borrowing costs, we need to raise the precept by approximately £2.50 per month, which means that residents will still be paying less than the average. The project cannot go ahead without increasing the precept. If residents do not support the project, then the developer's funds expiring next year (£450,000) will be spent by MK

The Town Council has also been involved with residents in the establishment of a Residents' Parking Scheme for the housing to the side of Campbell Park. Subsequently residents' parking has become subject to a charge levied by MKCouncil, but the Town Council was instrumental in reducing the charge from £50 to £25 per annum









MKC CONSULTATIONS

INTU PUBLIC INQUIRY





The Town Council has been involved in a public inquiry following its resistance to plans put forward by Intu. The Chair noted that it was ironic that the CMK Business Neighbourhood Plan, which received national awards and was adopted by MKCouncil should be challenged so soon after adoption

CMK Plan Wins Two National Awards

The pioneering CMK Business
Neighbourhood Plan has scored not
one, but two wins at this year's National
Planning Awards. The plan, which was
adopted by an overwhelming majority
of Milton Keynes residents and business
at referendums in May, won awards for
both Neighbourhood Planning and for
Community Engagement. MK Mayor
Cllr Keith McLean Joined members of
the Plan's steering group for the awards
ceremony.

The recognition in the Community Engagement category reflects the unique way in which the CMK Plan was developed. In its early stages, the plan was put on a Wiki website, allowing members of the public to make their own edits to the draft plan, directly shaping how the plan was created.



"Milton Keynes is famous for innovation," said Town planner David Lock, CBE, one of the business representatives on the steering group for the Plan. "We are proud that this pioneering type of neighbourhood

plan has won recognition from industry experts. Well-prepared Neighbourhood Plans are a clear expression of local preference that can bring real benefits to communities everywhere."

Cycle Hire Coming to MK

London-style "Boris Bikes" will soon be a common sight around Milton Keynes following the announcement of a new cycle hire scheme for the city. Sixty new 'bike docks' are set to be installed across the city from Spring 2016, opening up a wide range of cycling routes. It is hoped the scheme will encourage commuters to leave their car at home

The Milton Keynes hire cycles will benefit from the city's extensive redway network, allowing for easy and fast journeys between CMK



Minister calls for Public Inquiry

Following a request from CMK
Town Council, the Secretary
of State has called for a public
inquiry into controversial plans
by Intu to build over public
space. The proposals, which
Milton Keynes Council had
approved in September, involve
infilling space under the glass
arch of Midsummer Place, as
well as narrowing the reserved
transport corridor and public
walkway through the area.
Both are protected by the CMK
Business Neighbourhood Plan.

"Pushing this Plan aside has demoralised other communities that have put their faith in Neighbourhood Planning." says



Dr. Rebecca Kurth, CMK Town Council Chair. "We are very relieved that we will now have the opportunity to make our case before an independent inspector."

There will be an opportunity for residents to present their views during the inquiry. The independent planning inspector will review all the evidence presented before making a recommendation to the Minister, Greg Clark, who will make the final decision on whether to grant or refuse planning permission.

The public inquiry will take place later this year, most likely in September.

Rooms for Hire in CMK

Comment on Plan:MK



The future direction of development in MK over the next ten years will be set out in Plan: MK, Milton Keynes Council's new local plan for the borough.

Councillor Andrew Thomas, Chair of Planning and vice Chair of the Town Council then spoke about the work of the Town Council's planning committee.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS



Councillor Andy Thomas, the Chair of Planning, outlined the large number of planning applications the Town Council has considered in the past 12 months. He noted that every application receives due consideration and comments are registered with MKCouncil on all applications



How Parish and Town Councils Fit Into the Planning System



The Chair of Planning noted that as all applications are seen by the Planning Committee and that there is a very short timescale for responses this does put considerable pressure on the planning committee. He advised that the deadline of 21 days can be extended for complex applications. The following two slides gave some more detail on the process

- Parish and Town Councils are not Statutory Consultees (with the exception of Crown Land Applications)
- Parish and Town Councils are consulted under 8(1) of Schedule 1 to the1990 Act (local planning authorities: distribution of functions)
- Parish and Town Councils muct respond within 21 days of the consultation as required by Part 25 of the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (England) Order 2015

TWO TYPES OF PLANNING PERMISSION



FULL

- all changes of use
- for building works, the principle and detail together

OUTLINE

- only for the erection of a building and where one or more details are 'reserved' for later consideration
- 'reserved matters' are (a) access (b) appearance (c) landscaping
 (d) layout (e) scale

There might also be the need for: Listed Building Consent and/or Advertisement Consent as well as Building Regulations Approval





The local planning authority

"may grant planning permission, either unconditionally or subject to such conditions as they think fit, or they may refuse planning permission"

They

"shall have regard to the provisions of the development plan, so far as material to the application, and to any other material considerations"

Town and Country Planning Act 1990 section 70
