It's not all bad news for CMK's trees! A recent planning application to cut down trees at Witan Gate, near Petersfield Green, to build private parking spaces was refused by Milton Keynes Council following objections made by CMK Town Council. The reasons for refusal echoed our concerns that this would have been an ugly intrusion into a well-planned landscape which would have harmed the character of the area. Also, it was contrary to the CMK Neighbourhood Plan which protects the extensive 'Green Frame' of open space and trees which surrounds CMK.



Controversy at Saxon Gate



CMK residents recently led a deputation to Milton Keynes Council about controversial proposals for Saxon Court. The Council wishes to sell the building as well as the empty development site to the rear, but its "preferred option" is for buyers to demolish the building and replace it with a much larger development which would take up most of the surrounding public infrastructure.

When your town councillors heard about this idea, they delivered urgent letters to hundreds of homes explaining the likely negative impact on residents

through increased congestion, disruption to pedestrian and cycle routes, loss of trees and public parking bays.

Marc Carroll, who led the residents' deputation, told the assembly "This is overdevelopment of the site. Removal of these roads would create



great hardship for residents. At busy periods, the extra congestion on Avebury Boulevard which is a major bus route could add 20 minutes to journey times."

Dr Rebecca Kurth, chair of the Town Council, says "It is totally unnecessary to build over footpaths and side-streets when there is plenty of land to build new homes and premises in CMK without losing vital links in the city's grid. Also, we need all of this infrastructure to support existing residents as well as the thousands more who will be moving to CMK in the next few years."

The Town Council has submitted a strong case for MKC to drop this approach and concentrate on sustainable options. As long as the height of any new building steps down to respect nearby homes, and stays within the typical footprint for buildings in CMK this would prevent more conflict and upset.

MK at Centre of Growth Arc

Milton Keynes has been named as the heart of a new growth area reaching from Oxford to Cambridge. Announced by the National Infrastructure Commission, the Oxford-Milton Keynes-Cambridge Arc will be home to a range of scientific and research organisations, technology companies and universities, putting the city at the centre of Britain's own Silicon Valley.

Recycling made clear

Your New Precept

CMK Town Council is one of a number of parishes which have expressed an interest in taking on responsibility for some or all of the landscaping in the parish from 2020. Milton Keynes Council has seen its grants from central government reduced, which means that they need to look at ways to reduce expenditure. Reducing the number of times grass is cut, hedges trimmed etc is a way of achieving this.

However, CMK Town Council considers landscape maintenance a high priority and has assigned a budget to look into taking on landscaping from 2020, when the current contract expires. This would necessitate extra funding, and therefore the Town Council has agreed to increase its 2018-19 precept by 12.75% this year. The parish precept is a very small part of your overall tax bill, and this increase only amounts to £8.19 a year for the average household, but this could help prevent a further erosion of landscaping in your parish in future years.



CMK's New Police Forum

Do you have any concerns about safety and security in your area? In that case you are invited to attend the next Police Forum on Wednesday 11th April from 7 to 8pm at Margaret Powell House, Midsummer Boulevard. This new initiative by Thames Valley Police aims to identify the two most pressing issues for local residents and report progress every 3 months or so. There have been two meetings so far. The agenda for the next meeting is available on the Town Council's website.

The Police Forum will be followed by the Town Council's regular Residents' Forum. Residents who are interested in representing their neighbourhood are welcome to stay on or attend this separate event, where a wider range of local issues will be discussed.



Marlborough Gate Closure

A busy link in CMK's grid road network will be closed for up to nine months for building works on the new multi-storey car park near John Lewis.

The closure affects the section of Marlborough Gate between Silbury Boulevard and Midsummer Boulevard. The works involve creating a new traffic light junction on Marlborough Gate to handle the large number of cars which are likely to use the new car park when it opens.

The closure is scheduled to last until 22 September, during which time cars will be diverted over Secklow Gate Bridge, and bus services will be diverted along Avebury Boulevard and will not serve the stops along the north side of Campbell Park.

Have You Seen a Starship?

Have you noticed any small, white robots driving around CMK lately? American robotics firm Starship Technologies have chosen Central Milton Keynes to be the testing ground for their new autonomous delivery robots. The city's grid layout and step-free pavements make it ideal for testing the electric bots, which are designed to bring groceries and parcels direct to people's homes.

"Milton Keynes has earned a worldwide reputation as a city embracing autonomous vehicles and smart city technologies, in their early stage," says Henry Harris-Burland (VP Marketing, Starship Technologies). "Starship is interested in building it into a global showcase of autonomous local deliveries."

The company hopes that Milton Keynes residents will have access to the new technology before anywhere else in the country, with a new service launching shortly allowing any local business in MK to use the robots and start delivering to their customers at a low cost. Starship has also been working with local charities such as Willen Hospice, and is offering local charities and community organisations free use of the technology.



A new centre for young musicians and creative people to learn about the arts and develop hands-on skills is opening soon, bringing new life to the fringe of Station Square. New Money Recordings will open the facility soon on the upper floor of the former Central Bus Station, a great piece of Modernist architecture which Historic England listed in 2015.

Alex, one of the people helping to bring the new centre to life, says "we are in the process of building a new music academy for music and arts in Milton Keynes. We are building three recording studios, a rehearsal room, a photography studio and also a graphics room."

These attractive facilities are particularly intended for young people from disadvantaged backgrounds, so they can express themselves more artistically, make friends and develop practical skills to improve their career prospects.

To Oxford!

Rail links between CMK, Oxford and beyond are set to see major improvements as the East West rail project gets underway. A new company has now been formed to construct and operate East West Rail, the major new railway line which will link Milton Keynes to major cities in the Oxford MK Cambridge growth corridor.

New services will provide convenient links to Bicester, Reading, High Wycombe and London Marylebone. Essentially, this will restore the old 'Varsity Line' which linked Oxford to Cambridge from the Victorian era until the 1960's. When the first phase is complete, in 2022, it will take about 40 minutes from Milton Keynes Central to Oxford.

Offices to Homes

Live near an office? You might be getting new neighbours without even realising it. Over the past couple of years, several under-used office buildings in CMK have been converted into residential apartments. This has come about due to a Government policy called Permitted Development, which allows office building owners to convert them into residential use without needing to get planning permission.

Although intended to ease the housing problem and help struggling town centres, this can also lead to problems for nearby residents. A few months ago some residents living near Grant Thornton House, one such office building, contacted the Town Council with concerns about how the plans would lead to parking congestion, noise disturbance and refuse disposal issues in their area. Unfortunately, the automatic nature of Permitted Development means that the Town Council is unable to object to most 'office to resi' conversions. However, these conversions often come with physical changes to the buildings which do require planning permission, so the Town Council can object to these where it is appropriate, as we did in the case of the Grant Thornton House proposals. However, in the six months since that objection Milton Keynes Council has not yet reached a decision on the plans.
