

One of CMK's hidden gems is Grafton Park, a long, narrow space of greenery that sits behind the Pinnacle between Lower Second and Fourth Streets. Featuring a winding stream, a series of small ponds and classic MK benches set among flowering plants and bushes, the park is popular with workers in the surrounding office buildings.

A new ten storey hotel is now being proposed for a vacant site next to Grafton Park. The small development plot sits between the Jaipur Indian restaurant and Victoria House, a handsome, recently completed office building. Together these developments form the southern edge of the park, with the Pinnacle and a currently undeveloped car park forming the northern side. The Town Council is looking for improvements to the hotel design to make it more suitable for this prime site.



SAXON COURT VICTORY

Following representations made by numerous CMK residents, the Town Council and several other bodies, Milton Keynes Council decided to abandon proposals to build over key pedestrian, car and cycle routes around Saxon Court at their planning committee meeting this Spring. The final version of the development brief, which will guide potential buyers, no longer contains these controversial options. The Town Council had argued that it would destroy the classic CMK infrastructure, thereby creating safety and congestion problems for pedestrians, cyclists and motorists, as at The Hub. Milton Keynes Council still plans to sell the property, which is worth about £10m on the open market. Ultimately, the new owners may or may not decide to redevelop the current Saxon Court building and/or the undeveloped area of grass to the south.

Take Advantage of Sport Central

CMK gained its own multi-use sports facility late last year, which includes a full size training pitch set up for football and rugby matches, tennis and basketball courts. Now that the facility is up and running, the operators are keen to encourage local people, especially youngsters, to use the centre. Plans are being considered for a special hire rate for young people to use the centre over the summer. Visit www. hertsmereleisure.co.uk/sport-central for more information.

Hiring the basketball/netball courts costs £25 an hour, while hiring the tennis courts costs £14 per hour. The cost can be much less per person depending on the number of people playing. A seven-a-side football pitch can be hired for £50 an hour or the full eleven-a-side pitch for football or rugby for £130 an hour. The centre also has small and large club meeting rooms available for hire for £10 and £25 an hour each.

Yellow Lines for Adephi

Proposals have been announced for new yellow lines to reduce obstructive parking on the edges of the road at Adelphi Street. Although the Town Council supported residents who wanted a parking permit scheme to control roque parking in the area, it did not include the part closest to Silbury Boulevard when it was introduced in 2015. This section still suffers from a lot of on-street commuter parking. It is hoped the new lines will fix the issue completely.

CMK's New Insect Hotel

A new addition has joined Fred Roche Gardens, the large but often overlooked park that sits behind the Church of Christ the Cornerstone between Silbury and Midsummer Boulevards. An 'insect hotel' has been added, designed to attract and feed a wide range of insect species that are crucial for supporting the diverse range of flowers and plants that populate the park.

Campbell Wharf Takes Shape

The new marina at the easternmost end of Avebury Boulevard is beginning to take shape, with work now underway on the new canal bridge and mooring areas. It is expected that the first homes will be ready for occupancy towards the end of 2019.



The International Festival Returns

CMK takes centre stage as the International Festival returns to Milton Keynes from 20 – 29 July. A huge variety of events will take place around CMK and Campbell Park including comedy, music, acrobatics and dance.

Film-lovers can enjoy a floating cinema and free, open-air screenings at 12th Street. Vagabond has thrown down a '48 Hour Film Challenge' inviting filmmakers of all levels to make a short film in Milton Keynes starting 20 July (see https://vagabond.org.uk/48-Hour-Film-Challenge).

As for this year's MK Festival Fringe, it offers a largely free programme of performance, visual art, film, music and dance by artists currently based in or originally from Milton Keynes.

The Town Council is supporting one of the Fringe events through our grants programme for community projects in CMK. "Paradise Lost" is an installation by artist Anna Berry in collaboration with theatre director Rosemary Hill. Inspired by the stories of people who live on the city's streets, the installation will feature recordings and shredded plans of Milton Keynes. Berry is winning international recognition for her atmospheric work and says this new piece explores "how we

Other Fringe events include 'Peddlers Pack' (pictured above) at the Gallery and Library, a mystery drawing walk and animation workshop.



Your Elected Representatives

The last local elections saw some new ward councillors taking seats on Milton Keynes Council (MKC). However there are three levels of local government and this is a basic quide to who does what.

The first level of local government is the CMK Town Council, where local Town Councillors are elected to represent residents living in the CMK and Campbell Park grid squares. The next level is provided by your Ward Councillors. They are elected to the borough Council and not only cover the two central grid squares but look after residents in much larger wards. The CMK Ward (outlined in red) covers the city centre, Bradwell Common, Conniburrow and Oldbrook, while the Campbell Park and Old Woughton Ward (in blue), runs from Willen through Downs Barn and as far as Simpson.

Level 3: Parliament

MP for Milton Keynes North

Your local MP Mark Lancaster is your representative in the House of Commons. His constituency covers the entire north-eastern half of the Borough of Milton Keynes.





Level 2: Milton Keynes Council

Milton Keynes Council (MKC) is the council for the whole borough of Milton Keynes, representing about 300,000 residents. It provides most of the local services for residents, such as street lighting, road repairs, refuse collection, social services and council housing.

KEN BAKER One of the Fathers of CMK

CMK Town Council is sorry to announce the retirement of our longest serving Councillor and one of the founding fathers of Central Milton Keynes. Architect Ken Baker, who has served on the Town Council since 2008, will be moving to the south coast in September to be with his family. Ken was one of the team who originally designed the layout and form of the city centre with the Milton Keynes Development Corporation in the 1970s. In later years he worked with the renowned planning firm David Lock Associates, and has recently become a vociferous campaigner for the city and its original design principles.

Ahead of his departure, Ken will be leading a guided tour of Central Milton Keynes on 23 August at 10am. This all-day walk will go from the central station right the way to Campbell Park, with explanations of the unique features and characteristics of CMK and its buildings, drawing on Ken's singular knowledge of the city. Petit Oiseau ('little bird in French) bring together rare classical Indian string instruments with experimental synthesiser music to create a truly




distinctive sound.
