You are now living in the parish of Central Milton Keynes (CMK). Thousands of people come here every day as visitors, or to work here, but you live here and there are lots of things about CMK that you might find especially useful. This leaflet is designed to enrich your experience of living in CMK by listing local venues and organisations that offer a variety of facilities for residents.

In CMK you are part of a community of over 5,000 residents and over 1,000 businesses, with both numbers rising every month. Your local 'parish council' is CMK Town Council, comprising eight volunteer councillors (who are elected every four years) and a clerk. This is your Town Council, working to make life better for the CMK community and working to influence the decisions and policies of the larger Milton Keynes City Council that impact on us all. The different responsibilities of a local town council and the council responsible for the whole of Milton Keynes are not always understood, so we thought it would be helpful to outline them (see charts to the right).

If you have any issues with services provided by Milton Keynes City Council, e.g., refuse collection, street lights, broken pavements etc., the easiest way to report them is through the council's website *www.milton-keynes.gov.uk*

The Town Council meets once a month and members of the public are welcome to attend. Look for information about the dates for these meetings, and minutes of past meetings, on the CMKTC website or our noticeboard outside the Central Library.

Your CMK Local Area: useful and interesting stuf

CMK TOWN COUNCIL

Area of responsibility: the parish of CMK, which consists of the city centre and Campbell Park.

These two grid squares form a block of land 3.5km X 1.00 km extending from MK Central Railway Station to the Grand Union Canal, and from Portway (H5) to Childs Way (H6).

Income: small, from a small amount of the council tax (called the parish precept).

Staff: 8 elected councillors, clerk, part-time temporary 'contractors' employed on limited projects.

CMK TOWN COUNCIL SERVICES

Representation: supporting the well-being of CMK residents. We represent your voices and opinions to MK City Council and other organisations.

Evaluation of local needs: exploring opportunities for improving community, cultural and leisure activities in the parish.

Dog waste collection: ensuring regular collection of waste from the 3 bins located within Campbell Park.

Consultation: with Milton Keynes City Council on planning applications and other matters affecting our residents.

Offers: small grants to local organisations for activities of benefit to CMK residents.

MILTON KEYNES CITY COUNCIL

Area of responsibility: the whole of the borough of Milton Keynes.

Income: large, from Government grants, council tax, business rates, sales of land and property.

Staff: 57 elected councillors, over 2500 directly employed staff and others in subcontracted organisations.

MILTON KEYNES CITY COUNCIL SERVICES

Delivery: of services to the whole borough of MK as specified by the Government of England.

Provision of 'social' services: e.g., libraries, social care, housing, local transport, street lights.

General waste collection:

i.e., collection of household and commercial refuse, plus waste disposal.

Planning and development: all aspects across the Milton Keynes area.

Major funder: for many MK activities and services.

Enjoy your local green spaces

We have a number of parks in our parish.

Campbell Park is a large, award-winning green space containing a variety of landscapes, wildlife and art works. Visit www.theparkstrust.com/ parks/campbell-park. It is also the venue for various festivals and events that take place each year. The Park is managed by The Parks Trust, an organisation that also looks after most of the open green space in Milton Keynes.

Fred Roche Gardens is a small park behind the church of Christ the Cornerstone. It is managed by the Fred Roche Foundation: www.fredroche.

Grafton Park is

the smallest and least well-known park in CMK; close to the railway station, off Lower Second Street.

It's a little oasis close to the busy transport interchange of Station Square.

Secklow Hundred Mound (Ancient Monument). Behind the main Library and

between North 8th and North 9th Street is a small green space with a low mound covered with grass and trees. It is the site of an Anglo-Saxon court or meeting place called a 'moot'. Stop there to sit for a while and imagine yourself to be an Anglo-Saxon resident of Milton Keynes.

Local walks, cycle ways and the canal



Milton Keynes was planned as a city with excellent pedestrian and cycle ways. Some of these run just outside your home. You can find an interactive map of all the **cycle routes** across Milton Keynes at *https://getaroundmk.org.uk/ cycling/where-to-ride*

There are also a number of **art and heritage trails** (see the MK Council website at *www.miltonkeynes.gov.uk/leisure-tourism-and-culture*), some of which take in the public arts works in both the city centre

The Grand Union canal runs through Milton Keynes;inCMK you join it from the bottom of Campbell Park nearOvergate. There are excellent walking routes on either side of the canal andnumerous bridges.

The Community Boat *www.bmkwaterway.org/mkcommunityboatelectral* The Bedford and Milton Keynes Waterways Trust owns a new, electric community boat. Crewed by volunteers, it will run short pleasure trips along the canal, starting at Campbell Wharf, but can also be

booked for private events. Residents of the CMK parish qualify for a discount on ticket prices, and may also be interested in training to help crew the boat on a volunteer basis.

The Church of Christ the Cornerstone

Christ the Cornerstone is a Christian ecumenical partnership of five

denominations; the first of its kind in the UK. A chapel is available for private prayer whenever the building is open and pastoral workers are available Monday to Friday to help with personal problems.

The Church is part of a community building, managed by Cornerstone Trading (MK) Limited, and used by a wide variety of groups, including Tai-chi, Slimming World, choirs and orchestras, Centre for Integrated Living, English Language House. A variety of rooms are also available to hire for private events, parties and teaching.

There is a Roman Catholic Mass in the Church on Saturday afternoons and ecumenical services on Sunday mornings.
